Comments.

0. This united sorting string reflects as possible all particular ordering standards / traditions **but** the ones based on the principle «all national characters at the very end», for such a rule cannot be taken seriously and causes contradictions in cases when the same letters in another language are sorted normally.

1. Collating of rГ and жЖ is traditional in the sense that Ukrainian resp. Moldavian letter(s) denoting [h] and [g] resp. [ž] and [dž] are treated as **one** unit each in sorting.

2. Macedonian rГ and kK **replace** Serbo-Croatian ҺҺ and ҺҺ instead of **inserting** them after (in the case **Bulgarian**) гГ and кК, and it is obvious that rГ and kK **inherit** the properties of ҺҺ and ҺҺ, including their traditional ordering position as the **only one between** дД and eE resp. тТ and уУ.
